When the **Romans** invaded, they already had established laws which were brought over to Britain. Their **laws were called the Twelve Tables** 

and were written around 450 BCE.


The Anglo-Saxons lived by a payment system called wergild. If somebody had committed a crime, they had to pay compensation to the victims. They also had to complete trials of ordeals, which were extremely painful and usually involved hot water and fire.



During the **Tudor period**, harsher punishments were introduced that involved **mutilation**, **execution**, **humiliation** and **fines**. People were also punished and executed for not following the religion of the time.

During the Victorian period, the first police force was set up in Britain. Public hangings were stopped in 1868 and the prison system became organised and professional.



Victorian punishments

In 1829, politician, Sir Robert Peel, introduced the first English police force to improve public order in London.

Prisons became the main form of punishment. They were damp, unhealthy, **unsanitary** and over-crowded. All kinds of prisoners were mixed, men, women and children.
